CAMPAIGN OVERVIEW

Since 2004, the Ad Council has partnered with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Children's Bureau and AdoptUSKids on a national adoption recruitment campaign to encourage the adoption of children and teens from foster care.

There are currently 122,000 youth under the age of 18 waiting to be adopted. Teens have lower adoption rates than younger children, and often wait longer to be adopted. But no matter their age, all kids need a supportive and loving family, and the teenage years are an especially critical time for parental help and guidance.

PSA DESCRIPTION

Inspired by real family moments, the latest PSAs in this award-winning campaign highlight the heartwarming, fulfilling moments that adoptive parents can share with their teens. Created pro bono by the advertising agency Barbarian, the PSAs feature the tagline "You can't imagine the reward," reassuring prospective parents that adopting a teen can also help parents grow in new and life changing ways.

TARGET AUDIENCE

Adults ages 40- to 60-years-old, specifically prospective adoptive parents that have considered adopting but have not yet started the process.

CAMPAIGN OBJECTIVE

Encourage the adoption of children and teens from the U.S. foster care system and increase the number of potential families inquiring about adoption.
